## Eligibility requirements: /

Course objectives: The aim is to familiarise students with the fundaments of English lexicology, as well as to expand the knowledge gained in English Morphology. Beside the historical overview of the development of English vocabulary, word formation processes, and the lexical and semantic word structure, students will be introduced to the basics of English lexicography, as well as with the ways which some disciplines, e.g. corpus and cognitive linguistics, approach the vocabulary research and its integration into multidisciplinary language research.

## Learning outcomes:

Students will be able to use the knowledge gained in English morphology and to synthesise it with the basic lexicological issues.
Students will be able to differentiate between lexicological level, i.e. etymological, phonological, syntactic and semantic links made by linguistics with lexicology as one of its disciplines.
Students will be able independently to do lexicological research by using the presented selected linguistic tools.
